Here Armstrong provides a detailed report on activities at the school and its history (including, not only the progress of the Blacks, but also of Indian students); with reports of faculty, and much data on origins and achievements of the students.

In 1739 Coram, born in 1668, founded the London Foundling Hospital, considered to be the first incorporated charity. He early saw the value of Nova Scotia and actively promoted its "Advantages arising from Agriculture, Fishing, and Trade." References to other British American colonies are included, including Coram's advocacy of free trade between the colonies and the Mother Country. "To the Inhabitants of the Colonies therefore, there could be nothing more satisfactory, hardly any thing so advantageous." Most interesting of his ideas was "His last Design...a Scheme for uniting the Indians in North America, more closely to the British Interest, by an Establishment for the Education of Indian Girls. This is, indeed, a very political Contrivance; for if the Girls be brought up in Christian Principles, the Indian Children of both Sexes in the next Generation will be brought up Christians. This would be a refined Stroke of Policy."

A Patriotic Song - Written Expressly for the Log Cabin."

Strong, one of the Seneca chiefs, appeared in the succeeding year, and this met with several rejoinders and replies." Field 252.

"There was, undoubtedly, some collusion between some of the chiefs and the agents of Mass., whose consent was necessary to perfect the sale of the Seneca lands, by which a small number of the tribe were made to appear to be the majority. The inevitable, unvarying result followed, and the Indians were cheated and driven from their homes." Field 1524.

"Wheelock, a graduate from Yale in 1733, was pastor of the Second (North) Society in Lebanon, and a popular preacher during the Great Awakening. He began the Charity School (first called More's Charity School, after Col. Joshua More, who contributed a house and school-house) in 1754, and by 1765 had some forty-six pupils, all supported by charity. In 1769 Wheelock was given a charter to establish Dartmouth College, which he did in 1770, and became its first president" [Streeter Sale]. Wheelock's plan for the School, formed to instruct Indians and train them "as missionaries and teachers to their respective tribes" [DAB], evidently was inspired by his having taught Samson Occom in the 1740's.

This is the second issue of the first edition, with the errata at the base of page 61. It is the sixth of Wheelock's series of Reports on the Indian Charity School. Pages 54-61 print 'A poem on the rise and progress of Moor's Indian charity-school, (now incorporated with Dartmouth College) its removal and settlement in Hanover, and the founding a church in the same,' by Frisbie.

They have charged him, as trustee for Indian tribes west of the Mississippi River, with embezzling funds due from the federal government to those tribes. He reviews the slim evidence against him, rebuts it, and chronicles the libelous and slanderous campaign that has been undertaken against him.
